<u>Is the New Castrol GTX High Mileage Motor Oil right for your Corvair?</u>

Not too long ago Castrol introduced their GTX High Mileage engine oil to the market. This oil is specifically designed for vehicles with mileage of over 75,000 miles, which our Corolla has. Since our car had all the symptoms, such as leaky engine gaskets and seals plus a little exhaust smoke on start-up, it appeared to be the perfect candidate for a test of the GTX High Mileage oil.

Castrol High Mileage GTX is formulated so that it helps dried gaskets and seals in the engine swell or expand slightly to help eliminate leaks. As I mentioned earlier, this is generally caused by vehicles that are inactive and stored in dry garages. The other ingredients inhibit the burning of the oil when it gets into the combustion chamber due to wear or weeping seals within the engine.

Since we had just changed the oil about a week and a half before we received our test oil and the Corolla was already down a about a qt. due to a couple of long trips, I calculated the car to be using about a qt. every 300 to 400 miles, depending on how hard it was being driven. By just adding one qt. of High Mileage oil I found the car would run another 400 to 500 miles before being down a qt., a slight improvement.

Until the next oil change things stayed between 400and 500 miles per qt.. When it came time to change the oil we changed the filter and added the required amount of High Mileage to the engine. Having the High Mileage oil in the engine improved things so that we only needed to add a qt. around 600 to 700 miles.

Things seamed to be the same for the first 800 to 900 miles and then the lengths between adding oil became greater and greater. With no change of drivers and the same repeated trips I found that I was getting about close to 900 km before adding a qt. of oil.

I have to admit I am quite pleased with the results with the GTX High Mileage oil. As this type of gasket leak won't go away, short of doing major work to the engine, I never bothered going back to regular motor oil. You will find that the High Mileage oil is a bit more expensive than its regular counterpart, but to me it adds a little piece of mind that I am getting more than double the distance between adding oil to the engine. So, by cutting my oil consumption I am saving in the long run.

Castrol GTX High Mileage comes in two grades 5W30 and 10W30 and for our test we used the 5W30, as it is a little better in colder weather. Note that Castrol GTX High Mileage oil will not cure well-worn seals and gaskets; they will still need to be replaced to keep your engine running well.

SEMA SECURES U.S. SENATE RESOLUTION DESIGNATING JULY 9th AS "COLLECTOR CAR APPRECIATION DAY"

Lawmakers Acknowledge Importance of Collection and Restoration of Historic and Classic Cars

(Washington, D.C. - May 7, 2010) The United States Senate passed Senate Resolution 513 (S. Res. 513) at the request of the Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) and the Automotive Restoration Market Organization (ARMO) Council designating July 9, 2010 as "Collector Car Appreciation Day." The resolution was the result of an effort undertaken by ARMO as a means to raise awareness of the vital role automotive restoration and collection plays in American society.

S. Res. 513 was sponsored by Congressional Automotive Performance and Motorsports Caucus members Senator Jon Tester (D-MT) and Senator Richard Burr (R-NC). Senators Tester and Burr have been strong advocates for the automotive hobby in Washington, and S. Res. 513 reaffirms their understanding of the cultural importance of collector cars. The Caucus is an informal, non-partisan group that pays tribute to America's ever growing love affair with the car and motorsports. The Caucus recognizes the integral role collector cars have played in fostering our nation's appreciation for motorsports.

A Brief History of Valve Steam Dust Covers Courtesy of Coker Tire

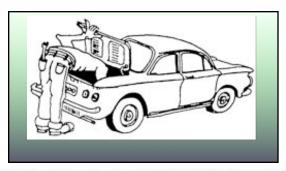
Dust covers and valve stem caps were, and are, used to keep dirt and debris from causing damage to the core of a valve stem, as well as dressing up the tire.

Brass dust covers were used from 1903 through 1915 on vehicles that were trimmed in brass (head lights, radiators, etc.). If the vehicle's trim was painted, then nickel dust covers were used. The length of the dust covers depended on the type of valve stem used, which was determined by the type of wheel used.

Starting in 1916, the nickel dust cover was the primary cover used. This continued until the end of 1929. In 1930, vehicle manufactures began using a nickel lock nut at the base of the valve stem along with a nickel "prong" valve cap on the tip. The "prong" cap could be used to remove the valve core for faster tire servicing.

During the same time, 1930 through 1933, Ford Motor Co. Continued to offer a full-length dust cover on certain models. From 1920 to 1933, vehicles with solid disc wheels and certain types of wire spoke wheels, used a valve stem with a 90-degree bend to allow easier access. This valve stem used the nickel lock nut and the nickel "prong" valve cap.

In 1934 the rubber valve stem became the standard in the industry. The valve cap took the basic shape of what is still used today. The dust cover and the lock nut were no longer needed with rubber valve stem.
