EARLY FALL FAMILY FLING

Split day offering history nestled in early fall splendor, lunch with a magnificent view and a guided cavern adventure. Come for all, come for some.

10:45 AM Fort Necessity - Step back in time to a replica of the fort built by George Washington in 1754 where on July 3, 1754 the Battle of Great Meadows began the French & Indian War. A tour of the replica of the fort, entrenchments, earth-works, and a log cabin will follow a ten minute slide/tape presentation in the Visitor Center. We will then stop at Mt. Washington Tavern on US 40 near the fort. This restored 19th century stagecoach inn features refurbished period rooms including barroom, parlor, kitchen, and bedrooms.

12:45 PM Mt. Summit Inn - dine in relaxed groups then enjoy a spectacular view from their scenic hilltop location.

2:30 PM Laurel Caverns - enjoy a spectacular, easy tour that rain can't disturb. The caverns include the "Grand Canyon" and other limestone formations. An adventure that will long be remembered. Even though normally closed after Labor Day, they have agreed to take us on their trackless train. This is a jeep-drawn (Corvaire?) open-air car that runs along the mountain edge of the Appalachians providing a breathtaking panorama of the area.

The expense for our family fling should be minimal. The morning is all "no charge" (unless you count your tax dollars). Lunch is extremely reasonable and the cavern/train should be about \$5.00 per person. This last amount will depend on the final number in our group.
