# Historic Roscoe Village

On September 12, 1888 the Corvair Club will be heading out to Roscoe Village in Coshocton, Ohio, for a trip into history. The drive will take approximately two and three-quarter hours.

Although nothing is written in stone yet, tentative plans might have us leaving Pittsburgh at 7:45 a.m., arriving in Roscoe Village around 10:30 a.m., with plenty of time to freshen up and perhaps get a snack before the 11:00 a.m. historic tour and ride on the Erie Canal boat. Lunch would follow and then the afternoon would be ours to further explore Roscoe's history and visit the town's unique and delightful shops. There will be many opportunities to nibble on whatever pleases your palette.

# History

Roscoe Village was an important canal port and a thriving milling center from the 1830s through the Civil War. The Village came to prominence as a result of the Ohio & Erie Canal, a transportation route built in the 1830s connecting Lake Erie at Cleveland with the Ohio River.

The canal eventually closed in 1913, and Roscoe fell on hard times. After decades of decay, Roscoe Village and its Greek Revival buildings began to be meticulously and carefully restored in 1968 by founders Edward and Frances Montgomery.

Today, over a quarter of a century later Historic Roscoe Village is alive with excitement generated by many living history buildings, costumed craft demonstrators, a variety of shops, great restaurants, festivals, the Roscoe Village Inn and beautiful perennial gardens. Visitors can also take a 45-minute canal boat ride on the Ohio & Erie Canal or tour a nationally accredited museum.

## Living History Tour

Begin your tour with a brief overview of canal history by viewing "Ditches of Destiny" and a visit to the Exhibit Hall in the Visitor's Center.

What you will see on the tour:

**The Blacksmith Shop**

Watch as the Village Smithy forges hot iron, using the techniques used in early Roscoe.

**Montgomery Press**

Try your hand at printing on a working 1800s printing press.

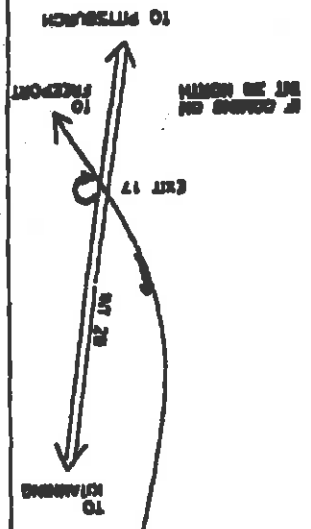
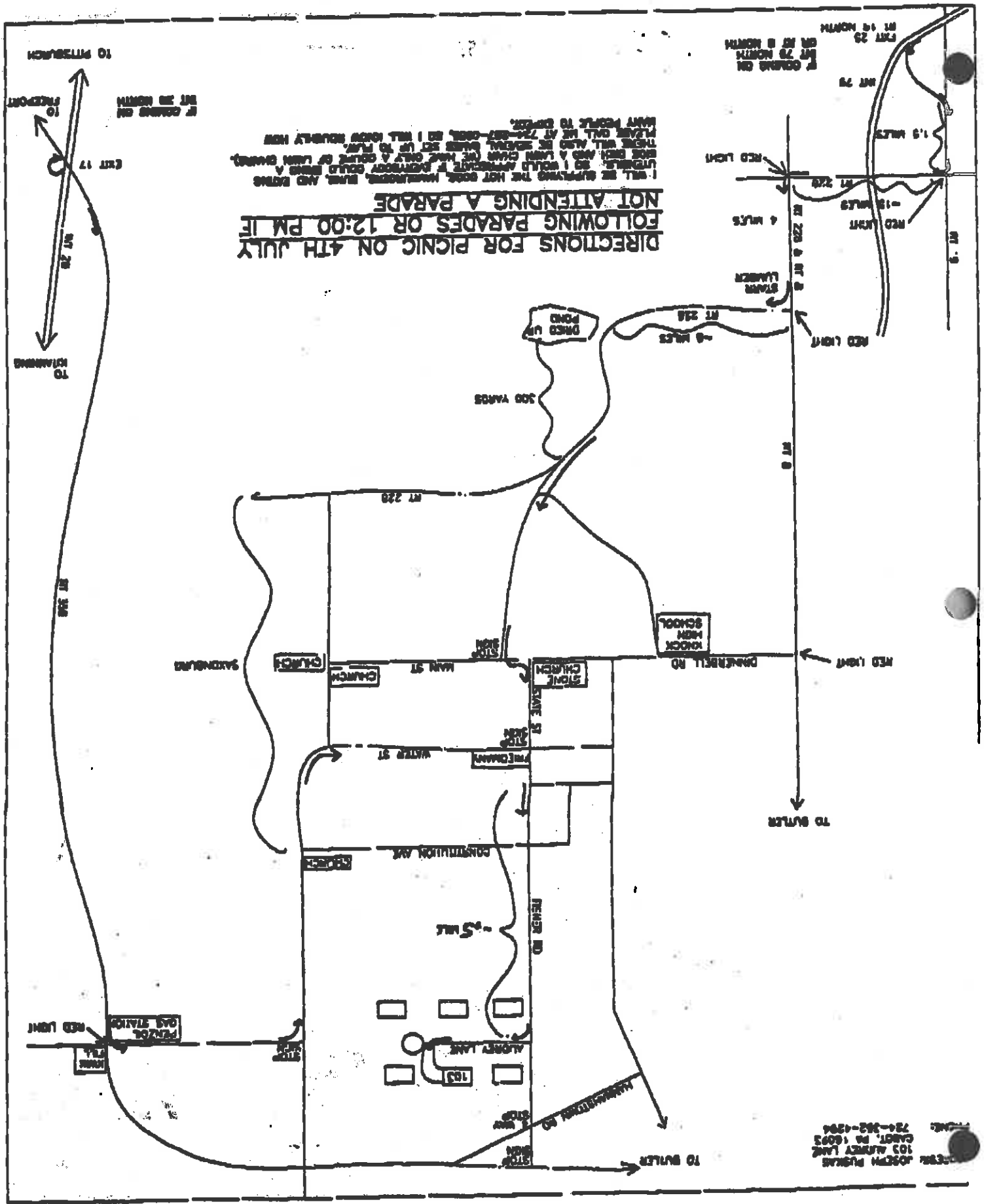
