



This was the home of **Dale & Nancy Bryant**, part of the host committee, who opened their home to the tourists for wine, cheese & crackers, and yummy hot hors d'oeuvres. Only then could we finally call it a day and head back to the hotel and plan for tomorrow.

Wish I could say that **Tuesday** dawned bright and clear but, alas, it was cloudy and rainy. Our goal was the town of Hammondsport at the tip of Keuka Lake where we visited the **Glenn Curtiss Museum**, named for




the town's favorite son and dedicated to this pioneer aviator. His work earned him U.S. pilot license #1 and acknowledgement as the "Father of Naval Aviation." The drive would have been spectacular on a sunny day, but even so, we appreciated the gorgeous hills and dales. Cookies and punch awaited at the Curtiss Museum which offered not only a peek into the history of aviation but also a peek at life in early 20th Century America.

A permanent display of doll houses offers a look at southern plantations and rural farms, while a huge wreath made out of human hair reminds us that all those Bakelite hair receivers had a purpose after all. Next was the Bully Hill Winery where the man behind the bar conducted the tastings with the panache of a stand-up comic. The wine is quite good, too, and we sampled some when we had a delicious lunch at Bully Hill's charming restaurant. The ladies would have loved to wander the shopping district in Hammondsport but the rain made that a dismal prospect, so we headed on back to the hotel.

An amazing sight awaited us on our drive home, though. In **Montour Falls** there is a waterfall. "What's so amazing about that? you ask. Well this one is smack dab in the middle of town. It's loud and large and right in someone's backyard, for heaven's sake. The photos don't do it justice, but try to imagine walking out your front door and going to the side yard for some flowers. Then imagine going to the OTHER side yard and sitting at the base of a 156-foot tall cascade! You gotta see it to believe it, folks, but we saw it and even in the drizzle we stopped for some photos.

Then we headed back along more scenic roads to our hotel to plan for tonight's picnic at Eldridge Park. This is getting to be pretty long, but I can say this: we weren't really "up" for a picnic. It was chilly and damp and the last thing we wanted was hot dogs served picnic style. Boy, were we wrong! The building was heated a bit and got warmer as the evening progressed, but the highlight was a performer named **Rick Wilson** who was both talented and charming. He had folks up and dancing

On Wednesday, we were off to Watkins Glen, racing mecca since 1948. Once again we traveled scenic roads to the historic village of Watkins Glen, where we boarded a cruise boat for a luncheon cruise around beautiful Seneca Lake. Then we drove into the village where a Grand Prix on city streets was laid out in 1948. The sport took off from there and is now home to Watkins Glen Race Track, a modern facility in every way. All the tourists got to drive three laps around the track, which was pretty exciting. We went into the village where the International Motor Racing Research Center welcomed us with a 15-minute slide presentation featuring Chevrolet cars of the ages. This facility has gained international standing as a research
